Aesthetic	Texts	Description	Example
Superhero	1	The aesthetic of superhero comics, a mix of sci-fi, heroism, myth, and speculative fiction	<i>Watchmen</i>
Western	2	Set in the US old west, ~1840--1900; classically includes cowboys, whiskey, shootouts, high noon, etc.	<i>My Antonia</i>
Prison	3	Takes place within a prison or other confinement camp	<i>One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest</i>
Noir	3	Hard-boiled, early Hollywood, mid 50s/60s, mystery, detectives (includes neo-noir)	<i>LA Confidential</i>
Cyberpunk	3	Corporate dystopia, sci-fi meets social criticism, with an emphasis on crime and/or societal underbelly	<i>Ubik</i>
Meta	5	A mix of aesthetics, usually designed to confuse or experiment (or have no verifiable aesthetics at all)	<i>Pale Fire</i>
Surrealism	5	Uses elements of myth, more surreal than magical fiction, but less than fantasy; exists in a "dream-like" reality	<i>Waiting for Godot</i>
Napoleanic	6	Often focuses on life and aesthetics during Napoleanic wars (between Georgian and Victorian aesthetics)	<i>The Brothers Karamazov</i>
Reconstruction	6	Post US Civil War, typically found in American Lit., includes a pastoral American South, sometimes dark, with elements of gilded age	<i>Huckleberry Finn</i>
Southern Gothic	6	Gothic transgression, but substitutes American prewar South as infringing influence rather than European Classical Age	<i>As I Lay Dying</i>
Apocalyptic	8	An aesthetic just before, during, or after the catastrophic end of civilization	<i>The Road</i>
Fairy Tale	8	A myth aesthetic, but uses common tropes as touchstones found in morality tales in traditional cultural heritages	<i>Peer Gynt</i>
Sci-Fi	12	A world which is defined by humans' relationship to technology - making, using, creating, reacting to, and misusing	<i>The Martian Chronicles</i>
Nautical	12	An oceanic aesthetic; ships, pirates, whaling, exploration, sea monsters, etc.	<i>The Old Man and the Sea</i>
Fantasy	13	Fanciful aesthetic, including magic, fantastic creatures, ancient evil forces, etc.	<i>The Lord of the Rings</i>
Georgian	14	Very pastoral, a transition period between Elizabethan and Napoleanic (includes first American literature)	<i>Moll Flanders</i>
Pastoral	18	An aesthetic which extolls country life over urban, the "good old days," simplicity, hard work	<i>The Good Earth</i>
Elizabethan	21	Early European renaissance, includes Age of Enlightenment and Age of Exploration	<i>The Duchess of Malfi</i>
Ancient	23	Ultra low-tech, BC aesthetic, often infringes on mythic or magical, includes Classical, Bronze, and early iron ages	<i>Antigone</i>
Gothic	25	Ghosts, castles, hauntings, monsters, darkness, romance, the past disrupting and transgressing against the present	<i>Frankenstein</i>
Midcentury	25	A backdrop of the Cold War, use of basic modern technology, includes content about Vietnam, Korea, the Red Scare, etc.	<i>The Godfather</i>
Interwar	30	Era between WWI and WWII; includes the Great Depression, often utilizes a modernist, stream-of-consciousness writing style	<i>Scoop</i>
Modernism	32	Embracing of wealth and technology in the early 20th century, fruits of industrial revolution/gilded age, uses specific writing style	<i>The Waste Land</i>
Contemporary	33	The aesthetic of the modern era (~1980-present), most notable for its inclusion of computers without being speculative or sci-fi	<i>The Crying of Lot 49</i>
Myth	32	Fanciful, theological, invented, or legendary aesthetics	<i>Ramayana</i>
Victorian	50	During the reign of Victoria (19th century), characterized by post-industrial revolution urban areas alongside ultra-pastoral countryside	<i>The Hunchback of Notre Dame</i>
